## Book Inauguration: Deciphering Pakistan's Education Reforms

During the workshop in Chicago, Wajid Hassan presented a brief summary of his recently published book "Deciphering Pakistan's Education Reforms".

The focus of his book is to empirically grasp the context and constraint regarding education reforms and offer principles to incorporate collaboration from politicians to the potential human capital of Pakistan. The status of Pakistan's education system lacks importance, consistency and motivation.

Pakistan who receives millions of dollars from around the world for infrastructure and education yet 58.7 out of 180 million Pakistanis live below poverty and 55 million children over the age of 10 cannot read or write. Incompetent politicians, unstable leadership, abandoned policies, conflicts within and outside its borders contribute to a deficit more important than money, the children.

Wajid also presented his recommendation directed for policy makers, governments (Central, Provincial, Local), for Media and some others for General pub-

# Whither Pakistani Americans

The focus of this brief presentation is the state of Pa -kistani-Americans and their future. I don't want to reminisce of the days gone by, when Pakistan was the critical U.S. ally and bulwark against communist expansion in South and South Asia and when over one million people welcomed President Eisenhower in Karachi in 1960. Never before, anywhere, a U.S. President was welcomed with such massive enthusiasm. And then, much later, in the 1980 's, Pakistanis shed their blood with Afghan freedom fighters to end the disastrous Soviet occupation of Afghanistan which proved to be a critical factor causing the demise of Soviet Union in 1991 and consequently huge peace dividend for the U.S. We Pakistanis come from a civilization- the most ancient of all civilizations of the world as anthropologists call the 5,500 year old Indus Valley civilization - and a culture where friendships are everlasting.

I want to focus on here and now. What Pakistan and its government is doing in comraderie with the U.S. to fight global terrorism is critical for the interests of all of us, the U.S. citizens. Brevity of this presentation precludes my sharing with the reader's details of the costs of this comraderie that Pakistan is bearing. But I assure you we are a people that friends can always count on, in need and in deed.

Pakistani-Americans are estimated to be over a million in the U.S., concentrated mostly in New York, Chicago, Houston, Detroit and the metropolitan areas of California and Virginia. A 2015 Migration policy report [1] states that approximately 453,000 Pakistani immigrants and their children live in United States. A 1996 publication, the three-volume Reference Library of Asian America [2], says a significant number of Pakistani Americans are highly educated engineers, doctors, scientists, teachers of all levels, bankers,

business executives and skilled professionals. They are well educated and often find work as taxi drivers, small among the highest salaried workers in the LIS. Their business entrepreneurs, gas station attendants, news high levels of education and income prevented them stand operators, etc. Unless each one of us resolve unto from being "ghettoized" in inner city areas or in low ourselves that he/she would attain at least the first gradpaying jobs. But sometimes they experience resentment uate degree ( M.A., M.S., M.B.A. etc ) and constantly and discrimination for being Muslims. Pakistanis are goad every one of his/her relatives and friends to do the mostly family-oriented people. They generally do very same, our future will be very bleak in the next two or well in school and their aspirations closely match the American dream. Most are home owners in suburban localities. There is little tendency to group together in a particular area. Hence, there are generally no significant ethnic neighborhoods where a Pakistani majority resides.

In my opinion, the future of Pakistani Americans which are considered to be the second fastest growing group in Pakistan, reported in Pew Research Centre report [3] and Dawn Newspaper [4] will be determined by the level of commitment we attach to four imperatives. The first and foremost among them is higher education. In the last two decades, the new arrivals from Pakistan have been from the lower middle class, who are not three decades. If we just look at the difference between the influence and clout that Jewish-Americans and Afri-can-American have over legislative, executive and judicial branches of federal, state and city governments, print and electronic media and big corporations, we can derive the right conclusions. Extensive research has proved beyond doubt that higher and professional education causally determine the lifetime income level, family cohesion, social prestige and community leadership capabilities of individuals regardless of age, gender, race, religion and cultural background. The very psyche, worldview and culture of a people change radically with higher education. The Holy Quran asks the question: "Are those who know equal to those who do not know? (39:9). Prophet Muhammad (PBUH) said we

should seek education from the cradle to the grave. I cannot overemphasize the fact that prosperity, dignity and prestige cannot be achieved if the Pakistani American culture doesn't regard higher education the sine qua non of our daily living. There are 168 hours in a week and only $10-15 \%$ of that time devoted to attending college can change our lives immeasurably.

The second imperative, in my opinion, is our continually being well-informed about the fast changing world. Among the four largest economies today, three are Asian - China, Japan and India following the U.S. but ahead of Germany, France, U.K., Italy, Russia and Brazil, in that order. With economic and technological prowess, diplomatic and political focuses shift and alter. What to say of some Urdu or English journals being published by Pakistan-Americans, even major U.S. newspapers and media outlets only selectively tell the real stories of daily happenings. We need thinktanks in every urban metropolitan area [5]. East-West University's think tank, the Center for Policy and Future Studies, will Insha'Allah bring out its quarterly journal, East-West Affairs, next year. Pakistan's exForeign Secretary, Hon'ble Riaz Khokhar, has shown interest in joining it.

We have too many organizations in every city and many organization keep splitting with time. But we must have one national organization. Only Pakistani American Congress, which was established in 1990, deserve to be strengthened because, among other characteristics, it is not one man oriented. There are people among us who want to be chairmen permanently. They start new organizations only to stay chairmen, since they can't continue as chairmen in the old organizations. PAC, on the other hand, is an umbrella organizations of 57 affiliates spread throughout the U.S. and its present, duly elected, fifteenth president, Wajid Hassan has devoted unprecedented resources of his own for PAC's growth and effectiveness.

Our last but not the least imperative is to make combined and ingenuous efforts directed at our fatherland Pakistan's social, political and economic development. America is a land of immigrants. The earlier European immigrants never forgot their countries of origin and strived for their development consistently over the last two centuries. The Marshall Plan after World War II helped European nations develop fast and now some European countries have higher GDP per capita than the U.S. Chinese Americans have materially contributed to China's phenomenal growth in the last two dec-
ades. Pakistan deserves to be South Asia's most developed, prosperous and dignified nation. Just in the field of education, we can build in Pakistan schools, colleges and universities of international standards to function as catalyst institutions. It is quite possible to mobilize resources for such development projects in the private sector, without straining government funds of the provinces or the federation of Pakistan.
